The EAC Board of Trustees serves as stewards of the school and is deeply committed to providing effective school governance. Working closely with the school administration, the Board monitors the school's financial heal and guides its strategic direction and continuous improvement. During the 2022-23 school year, the Board continued to strengthen its communication with the broader community, reporting main goals and achievement, together with the leadership of the school, on an annual basis at the Annual General Meeting (AGM).

The Board of Trustees organizes itself into four sub-committees, in support of its overall work. The Finance Committee (overseeing financial reporting and capital expenditure) and the Governance Committee (overseeing policy review, deployment of a comprehensive compliance program, and general matters of governance) are both standing committees. The Arts Center Committee is an ad hoc committee whose focus is in support of our plans to build an Art Center. And, by the end of 2023, the Development Committee was created to support all the efforts to work with our community and the society of Campinas to identify additional financial resources, via fund raising activities, that will support our facilities master plan and other needs of the school, to be launched in 2024.

This year, the Board of Trustees worked closely with the Head of School to achieve many of its strategic targets. In articulation of the Mission, Vision and Core Values, and in fulfillment of its Strategic Goals 2027, EAC launched its newly revised Principles of Learning during the 2022-23 school year and highlighted these Principles at the Annual General Meeting in March 2023.

In preparation for EAC's future, the Board of Trustees oversaw the second year of the new Facilities Master Plan, focused on the following strategic areas:

- Outdoor Learning Areas
- Campus Beautification
- Sustainability
- Sports Facilities
- Arts Facilities
- Technology
- Health, Safety and Maintenance

In fulfillment of the second year of the plan, the school carried out 100% of its planned projects, including:

- Installation of a robust solar panel system, generating sufficient electricity to meet EAC's demand, demonstrating our commitment to environmental sustainability.
- Creation of a dedicated outdoor learning space for Grade 5 students.
- Renovation of bathrooms in the middle school wing, including the creation of two additional bathrooms.
- Renovation and retrofit of the interior of the restaurant and the entire kitchen, optimizing the existing facilities provide lunch service to over 1000 students and staff daily.

Preparations for the third year of the FMP were developed over the course of the 2022-23 school year, as the school made plans to:

- Create an outdoor learning space for Grade 2 (a continuation of the multi-year Outdoor Learning Areas theme).
- Renovate existing bathrooms near the Grade 3 and 4 classrooms, including creating additional bathrooms for staff use (the second year of a multi-year process of renovating EAC's bathrooms).
- Enclose and air-condition the school restaurant, improving the space for students and staff, in preparation for the eventual Arts Center construction
- Install a comprehensive facial ID and car ID system to ensure proper identification of all EAC stakeholders and visitors who visit the campus, strengthening our commitment to Child Protection.

The Board continued to support and monitor closely the school's municipal application and legalization processes, to secure the eventual permit for Arts Center, laying the foundation for its future build. Over the course of the 2022-23 school year, plans for the new Arts Center were finalized and the construction bid process got underway, coordinated by a Project Management team selected by the Board - Plan Services. In June of 2023, EAC received approval for the demolition of the Old Gym, and plans are laid for the construction of the Arts Center to occur during the 2023-24 school year.

In addition to the above, in June 2023, the Board approved the purchase of the corner property on Rua Salesópolis, which is a key strategic element for an eventual access entrance to the school, in conjunction with the new Arts Center.



The Board remains steadfast in its commitment to not only the infrastructural, financial, and operational excellence of EAC but also to the core mission of enhancing educational excellence and the learning environment. As we move forward, a significant focus will be placed on initiatives that directly impact the quality of education and enrich the overall student experience, with special focus on IB and SAT results, always striving to get our students at the best possible universities in the globe. This approach aligns with our strategic vision to foster a nurturing, innovative, and inclusive educational setting for every member of the EAC community, but with a stronger educational result.

Furthermore, by the end of 2023, the Board will initiate the process of engaging with an external company to conduct a comprehensive search for a new Head of School. This critical step is aimed at ensuring that EAC continues to be led by an individual with a profound understanding of our mission, vision, and the dynamic needs of our school community. The new Head of School is expected to commence their role in mid-2025, marking the beginning of a new chapter in EAC's journey towards educational excellence.

Lastly, I wish to share that there were two updates in associated company membership of the EAC Board of Trustees this year. The first change was the departure of the Westrock company. We are very grateful for their numerous contributions, after many years of dedicated service to EAC. The Board was pleased to welcome the return of Sylvamo (formerly International Paper), an associated company who was on leave for the past two years.

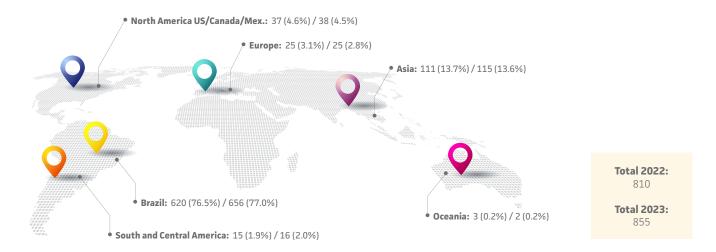

EAC Student Enrollment 2014-2023*

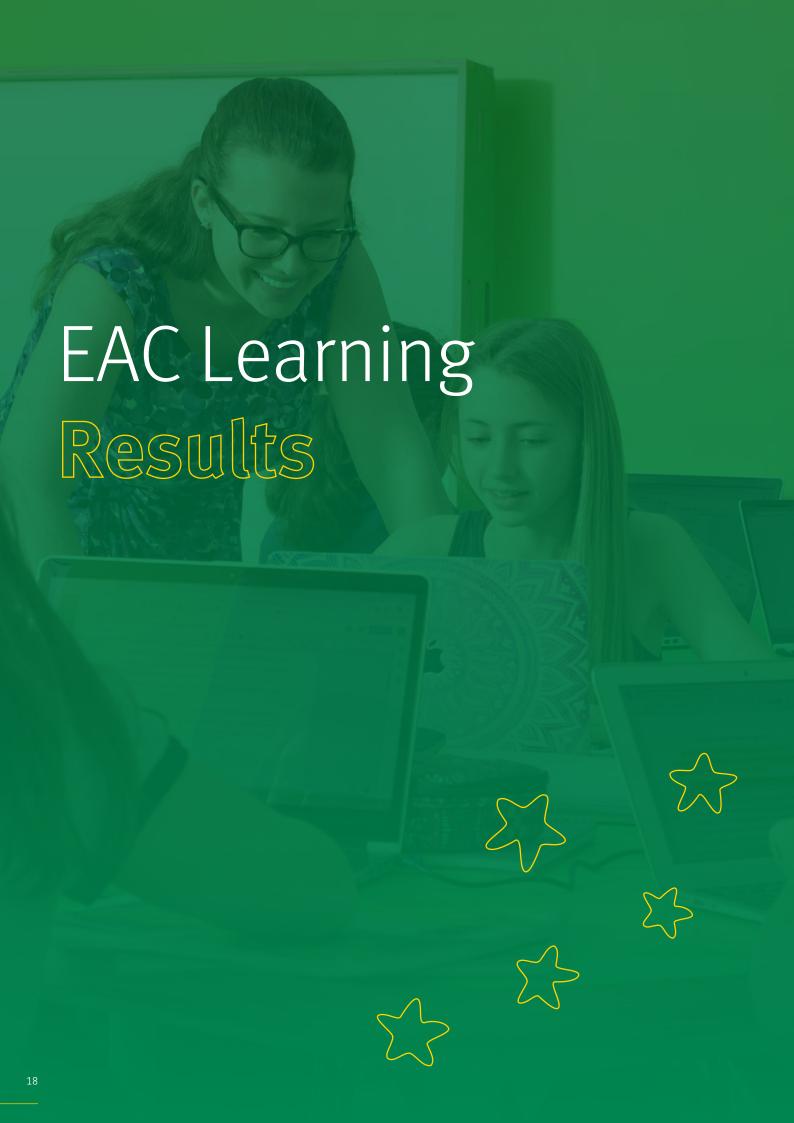

Each year, EAC students take part in a wide range of external, standardized assessments that help document student growth as well as allow for student achievement to be measured in comparison to local, national and international standards.

During the 2022-23 school year, students at EAC were able to take part in several standardized assessments, in the areas of:

- IB Diploma (Grade 12)
- Measures of Academic Progress (Grades 1-9)
- SAT (Grades 11-12)

As well, students from the Class of 2023 continued to matriculate in top universities around the world.

For Brazilian students, EAC used a Portuguese language assessment from the Cesgranrio Foundation, to measure proficiency in Grades 5, 7, 9 and 11.

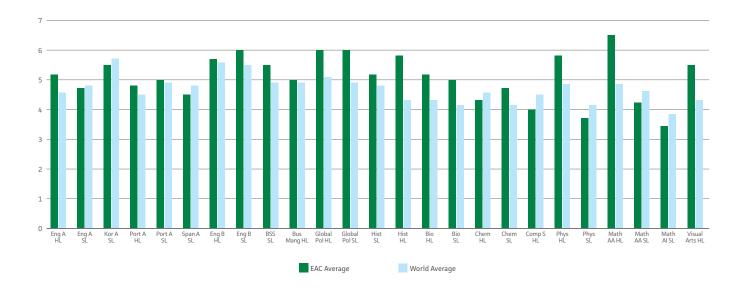
International Baccalaureate Diploma Results

EAC offers the International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma Program, a very rigorous two-year university preparatory program of studies, culminating in external examination and moderation. We offer an inclusive "IB for All" program and encourage all our students to pursue the diploma. The diploma is awarded to students who gain at least 24 points, subject to minimum levels of achievement across the whole program and satisfactory engagement in the core of the Diploma; Creativity, Action and Service (CAS), Theory of Knowledge (ToK) and the Extended Essay (EE). The highest total that a Diploma Program student can reach is 45 points. The IB Diploma is a qualification recognized and respected by the world's leading universities.

We are especially proud of our results and know that they could not have been achieved without the dedication of the teachers who guided the students through the Diploma.

Measure of Academic Progress (MAP) Results

EAC administers the MAP Assessment 3 times per year (September, February, and May) to students in Grades 1-5 and 1 time a year in May to students in Grades 6-9. This assessment was developed by the Northwest Evaluation Association and is used extensively in the United States as well as by many international schools. Over one million students took the MAP test outside of the United States during the 2021-2022 school year.

The MAP Assessments are computer adaptive achievement tests in Mathematics, Reading, and Language Usage. The computer software adjusts the difficulty of the questions so that each student takes a unique test. The difficulty of each question is based on how well the student has answered previous questions.

The MAP test measures the following strands that are aligned to US educational standards and are addressed in EAC's Math and English language arts curricula.

MAP is a norm-referenced measure of student growth over time. MAP assessments, joined with other data points, provide detailed, actionable data about where each child is on his or her unique learning path. MAP assessments track student performance and progress throughout a year and across school years, and by being linked to software tools which can assist teachers and administrators in planning instruction.

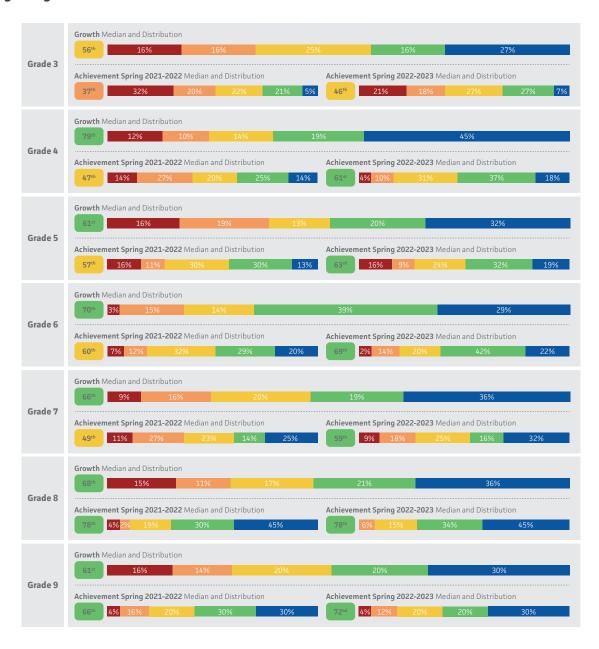
MAP tests are based on a continuum of skills in Mathematics and Reading from low skill levels to high skill levels. MAP assessments help teachers identify the instructional level of the student and also provide context for determining where each student is performing in

relation to local or state standards and national norms. MAP reports allow teachers to better target instruction based on students' strengths and needs.

2022-2023

Below you will find a comparison between the performance of EAC students and US norms, using the end results form the 2022-23 school year. We tested students from $1^{\rm st}$ to $9^{\rm th}$ grades. In Science, we only test $8^{\rm th}$ -graders and the content covers the entire middle school curriculum.

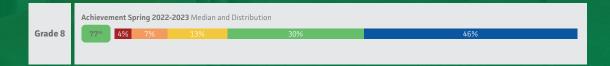

PORTUGUESE PROFICIENCY TEST 2022/2023

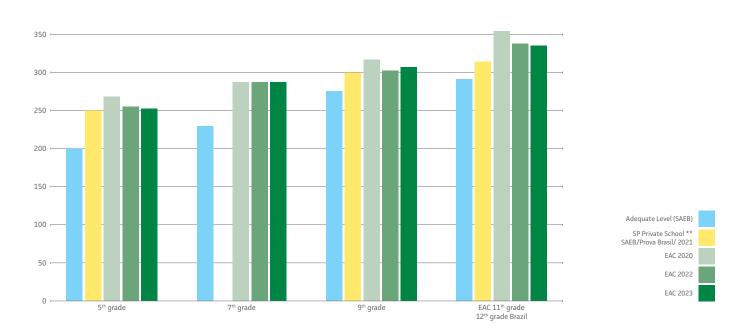

In March of each school year, EAC administers a diagnostic evaluation for 5th, 7th, 9th and 11th grades (Brazilian students). This external evaluation was prepared by Fundação Cesgranrio with items adjusted by TRI (Teoria da Resposta ao Item) within the parameters set by SAEB (Sistema de Avaliação do Ensino Básico), through "Prova Brasil." The main objective is to evaluate student competencies and abilities in the Portuguese Language - Reading and Writing. This diagnostic evaluation has become an important instrument to improve teaching and consequently, the performance results of the students. Due to the nature of the pandemic, students were not tested in March/2021.

Table 1 - Reading Averages (0 - 500 points) - EAC 2020/2022/2023 and SAEB/Prova Brasil 2021

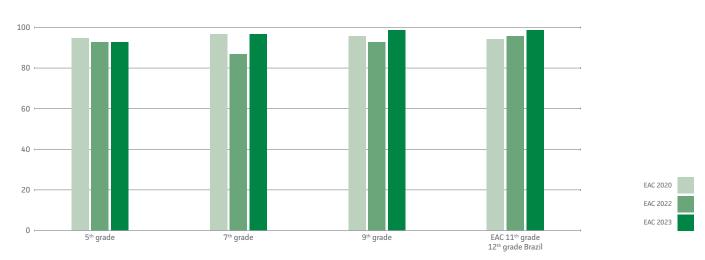

Table 2 - Writing Averages in percentage (0 - 100%) - EAC 2020, 2022 and 2023

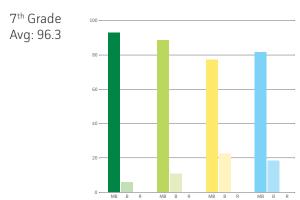


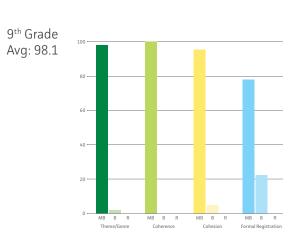

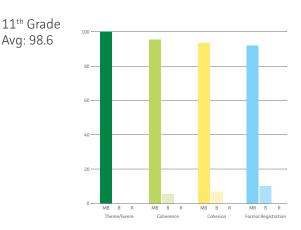

The SAT (Scholastic Aptitude Test) is a traditional college/university admission test used as a part of the application process for colleges in the US. Universities in Korea, and a select few in Brazil and Europe, may also use it as part of their application process to supplement academic information. It is a multiple-choice, computer-based test created and administered by the College Board. Math and Evidence-Based Reading and Writing are scored on a range up to 1600.

We have seen a shift in the general need for any standardized testing since many universities have been "test blind", "test optional" or "test flexible" since 2020. In most cases students may still submit scores or to use alternate test scores, such as the IB, to fulfill a testing requirement. We have seen the reflection of this change in policy over the last few years:



- 70% of the Class of 2021 took the SAT and only 17% submitted their scores to universities.
- 67% of the Class of 2022 took the SAT and only 14% submitted their scores to universities.
- 71 % of the Class of 2023 took the SAT and only 21% submitted their scores to universities.

Because of this shift, the counselors at EAC have been working closely with students and families to decide when and if SAT/ACT testing should be part of each individual students' college planning.

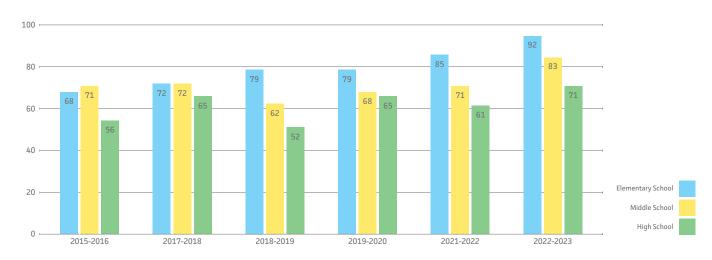

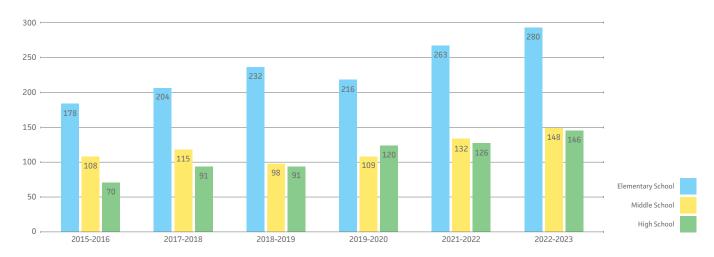

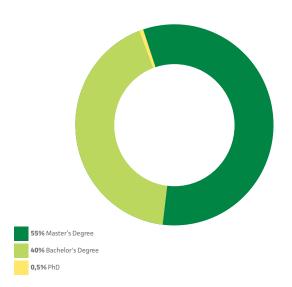




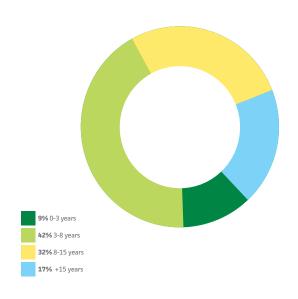


7:1 Student to faculty ratio

State University of New York: Buffalo State

Twelve members of the EAC faculty/staff continue their work to earn an onsite Masters Degree in Multidisciplinary Studies with a focus on 21st century learning from the State University of New York Buffalo State.

International Baccalaureate Organization (IBO)

EAC Upper School IB Diploma teachers attended specific training in the new guides for subjects that underwent curriculum reviews, or received training for teaching a new IB Diploma subject.

Eight Upper School teachers attended IB training on the Approaches to Learning (AtL) skills, strengthening their understanding and practice in embedding these skills into units of work.

All EAC Elementary School teachers attended training on Making the PYP Happen and Evidencing Learning.

Virtual consultant: Mathematics Teaching and Learning in the Elementary School

Grade level teams from the Elementary School took part in year-long mathematics training with consultant Carol Wallace from the Math Learning Center (Portland, Oregon) to deepen their understanding and strengthen their teaching practice in the area of mathematics.

First Aid Training - "Lei Lucas"

In July 2022, EAC nurses were trained to become first aid trainers and in January 2023, all faculty were trained in first aid, fulfilling (and exceeding) the requirements of "Lei Lucas."

Lexis Education: Teaching English in Multilingual Classrooms

Beginning in January 2023, teams of teachers in the Elementary and Upper School participated in the equivalent of a 10-week course (three hours per week), learning how to embed English language instruction in classrooms of varying disciplines.

Council of International Schools (CIS): Evaluator Training

Three EAC staff were trained by CIS to be able to serve as evaluators for other schools in their accreditation (or reaccreditation) process.

Association of American Schools in Brazil (AASB)

Six EAC Brazilian Program teachers attended *The Jornada* at The American School of Rio de Janeiro. *Jornada* is designed for educators who teach the Brazilian curriculum in American schools in Brazil. Four EAC Brazilian Program teachers were invited to present workshops at this conference.

Child Protection Training

One of EAC's counselors undertook training overseas with the Council of International Schools to complete the Child Protection Foundation workshop.

Wednesday Professional Learning

Within each school, faculty engage in professional learning on Wednesdays. The learning is often facilitated by teacher leaders, principals and assistant principals, and counselors/psychologists, and is related to school and grade level goals and priorities.

Teaching Assistant Training

The Elementary Assistant Principal developed a shared understanding of essential agreements, approaches, philosophies and procedures with all the teaching assistants, over the course of ten monthly sessions.

Collectively, these professional learning experiences equip educators to meet the diverse learning needs of our students while supporting our commitment to continuous improvement.





The Facilities Master Plan provides an adaptable "road map" to guide the growth and improvement of our learning spaces over a span of 5 years. It calls not only for creating new learning spaces, but also to renovate and renew existing ones. All capital projects listed in the Facilities Master Plan follow a feasible project sequence and are accompanied by thorough educational needs assessments.





Middle School and Elementary Outdoor Learning AreasNew outdoor learning areas for our Upper Elementary and Middle School students.

Sports Office / New Gym / Booster Club - Second floor to our New Gym that now holds our Physical Education and Athletics departments, and a dedicated space for EAC merchandise.

Upper School bathrooms - Renovated bathrooms in the Upper School, increasing the numbers and focusing on accessible use.

Flooring - Upgraded floor lining of our Preschool & Elementary Book Room, New Gym, and Preschool Restaurant.

Solar Panels - Clean, sustainable energy investment with the installation of solar panels in three locations: on the rooftop of the modular classrooms, Middle School building and New Gym.

Kitchen Renovation - Kitchen area renovation with an equipment upgrade, storage maximization and better traffic flow.

Security Cameras - Upgraded security system by adding an additional 80 security cameras, furthering our commitment to Child Protection.

Elementary Windows & Blinds - Installation and enlargement of all Elementary School windows, for increased air circulation.





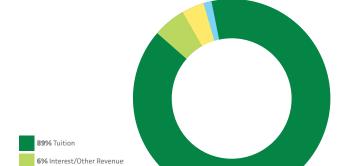

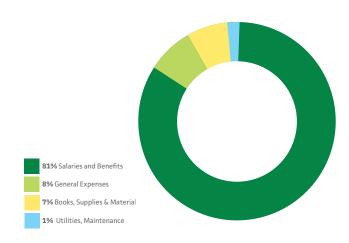

EAC Total Incomes 2022-2023



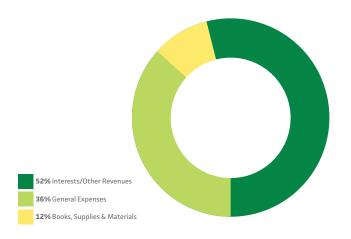
EAC Operational Expenditures 2022-2023



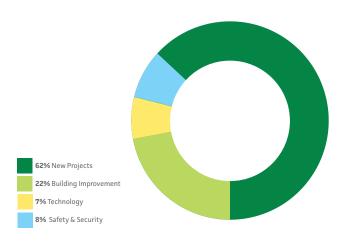
EAC Capital Fund 2022-2023
